#### **Directions to Host Schools**

#### Horndean Infant School

#### Driving via the A3M:

Take junction 2 towards **Cowplain**. Keep straight on over Morrisons roundabout and traffic lights (middle lane, signed Catherington). In Catherington Lane take the fourth right turning into **Merchistoun Road** (just before Pelican crossing).

Horndean Infant School is some way along on the left, |||| blue metal railing fence ||||. Parking in school is limited, please park safely and considerately outside the school. If the gates are shut use the intercom to contact the office.

#### Coming by bus:

We are well served by buses on the A3 corridor including the frequent number 41, Portsmouth - Waterlooville - Clanfield service. Also the 37 service between Havant - Waterlooville - Petersfield. Alight at the Napier stop (Colonial Pub). From next to the pub on your right, keep following the pavement into Napier Road and then Merchistoun Road until you come level with the School | | | | blue metal railing fence | | | | on the opposite side of the road. Use the ramp to help cross the road. If the gates are shut use the intercom to contact the office.

#### Horndean Junior School

#### Driving via the A3M:

Take junction 2 towards Cowplain. Keep straight on over Morrisons' roundabout and get in the right hand lane to turn right at the traffic lights (signed Horndean). Drive past the Colonial Pub and take the next left turning into Five Heads Road. Continue along the road a few hundred metres and the school is located on the left hand side.

#### Park Community School

#### From M27 (Portsmouth/Southampton) or A27 (Chichester):

- > Take exit for A3
- > Take exit marked for Purbrook and Leigh Park
- At top of slip road turn right at roundabout
- > At next roundabout (B&Q warehouse on your left) go straightover
- > At next roundabout (Asda on your right) go straightover into Purbrook Way
- > At next roundabout turn left into Middle Park Way (petrol station on your right)
- > School entrance is about 1/4 mile down on left hand side
- > Visitor parking is located immediately inside entrance on right hand side


#### From A3 (Petersfield/London):

- > Take exit marked for Waterlooville
- At top of slip road turn left onto Hulbert Road (sign posted Havant and Leigh Park)
- At roundabout turn left into Purbrook Way
- At next roundabout (petrol station on your right) turn left into Middle Park Way
- School entrance is about 1/4 mile down on left hand side
- > Visitor parking is located immediately inside entrance on right hand side

# **Secondary School Immersion Induction**

Secondary School is attended from age 11 to 16 (or 18 if sixth form provision is included — though in Hampshire this is generally through college). This stage is critical for pupils to raise ambition for the future. They study for GCSE or equivalent qualifications which usually involve elements of choice in subjects.
